

What is God's work of creation?

In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth (NASB; Gen. 1:2).

. . . God, who gives life to the dead and calls into being that which does not exist (NASB; Rom. 4:17).

By faith we understand that the worlds [ages] were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made out of things which are visible (NASB; Heb. 11:3).

For in six days the LORD made the heavens and the earth, the sea and all that is in them. . . (NASB; Ex. 20:11).

God saw all that He had made, and behold, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day. Thus the heavens and the earth were completed, and all their hosts (NASB; Gen. 1:31-2:1).

God's work of creation is His making all things of nothing, by the word of His power, in the space of six [literal] days, and all very good.
